Principal's Corner

In September all students completed the first of three summative assessments in math and reading. The STAR assessments are used to identify each individual's proficiency levels and serve as a baseline on which to measure student growth through the course of the year.

Much has been discussed about the role of tests in today's schools. Concerns are often expressed about "teaching to the test," testing taking away from learning, and students just being seen as numbers. At Sacajawea, we utilize our assessments for specific purposes that not only measure but support student learning.

The information gained from the STAR assessments allows us to identify students who would benefit from additional support in their reading or math learning. The data, combined with other relevant evidence, can guide the placement of students into math strategies, literacy workshop, teaching combo, or Access support classes. The focused and intentional instruction in these settings often provide the additional support needed for kids to have greater success in their learning.

These assessments also provide direct guidance on the standards on which students need to develop. Teachers can focus on the specific standards not yet mastered by the individual students in their classes. Furthermore, teams of teachers find common standards on which to focus in each class to provide consistent support for their kids.

The students will be tested two additional times this year with the STAR assessments to identify their continued growth. After each test, data will again be analyzed to review the effectiveness of any interventions and to track progress. Look for information on how your son or daughter performed at the December student-led conferences.

By using assessment data to respond to student needs, we believe testing can be a valuable tool in helping all of our kids succeed.

Picking Up Students During The Day

Fall Fundraising SUCCESS!

A HUGE THANK YOU to all who contributed to our two campaigns. We set an ambitious goal of \$40,000 to bring new technology into the classrooms and to help our teachers and students with extracurricular projects like field trips and classroom materials. Attendance Matters at Sacajawea

Here are some facts about chronic absenteeism:

- Your children can suffer academically if they miss 10% of school days (about 18 days). That can be just one day every two weeks, and that can happen before you know
- By middle and high school, chronic absence is a leading warning sign that a student will drop out.
- It doesn't matter if these absences are excused or unexcused; they all represent lost time in the classroom and a lost opportunity to learn.

What can you do?

- Set a good example. Show your child that attendance matters to you.
- Help set homework and bed times; allow for 8.5-9.5 hours of sleep.
- You can turn to the school for help. Call Valentina at 522-6400: she is our mentor to students and families with attendance issues.
- Schedule family vacations to coincide with school breaks.

Tips for Protecting Kids on Social Media

Keeping our kids safe is vitally important both in our community and online. Here are a few suggestions from the Nation Center for Missing and Exploited Children: Know your child's passwords.

It is ok for parents to have a child's password for sites such as Facebook, Instagram and Gmail. Share with your child that this is another way that you protect and care for them. Check their accounts often. Discuss any concerning content with your child.

Read what your child is posting.

Check comments and images for personal info (phone numbers and address). Scan for inappropriate (or illegal) content such as mean statements, foul language, or racy pictures. Delete anything you feel is offensive or provides too much information and talk to your child about the decision.

Know how your child accesses social media.

Mobile devices (like cell phones and tablets) let kids access social media apps away from adult supervision. Children may post content or even share their locations. Review the app settings and help children keep their current and frequent locations private.
